




KANSAS HOME VISITING REACH



Home visiting offers the flexibility to meet Kansas families on their own terms. Programs in Kansas include **Early Head Start**, **Healthy Families**, **Parents as Teachers**, and others. Service delivery models range from universal initiatives to those that focus on the state's families most in need. In 2011, the **Kansas Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting (MIECHV)** program was launched to further increase the number of pregnant women and families with children birth to age 5 who receive voluntary home visiting services. Expectant mothers and families work with home visitors to prepare for the ups and downs of parenting, and ensure that their children are healthy and developmentally strong.




